

Defining Climate Change Leadership in Practice and Leadership Work

The Climate Change Leadership in Practice course is a 30 credit course, to be studied full time (100%) from August 30th, 2021 until January 16th, 2022. Broadly the course divides into two sections;

- 1) the first six weeks (August 30th-October 10th) where we will spend more in-class time together defining climate change leadership in practice and exploring the specialisation for your leadership work. This section is split into 4 modules as shown below.
- 2) the remaining weeks (October 10th-January 14th), where you will engage in your leadership work and reflect upon your perspective of climate change leadership in practice. We will still have weekly in-class sessions during this time but less frequently, so that you can commit your focus to affecting change.

Module Overview (course section one)

Systems of Power and Resistance - SPR

In this module we'll interrogate the entanglements of our times. We'll explore how particular peoples, practices, institutions and narratives have been historically empowered and elevated themselves at the material, spiritual and mortal cost of others. We'll also look at how these guiding stories and structures have turned their assumptions into 'truths' which continue to act as foundations for thinking in wide-spread disciplines and discourses.

Places and Memories: Entangled and Embedded - PMEE

In this module, we'll look at how people, bodies, things and their movements embed and enmesh in / as places. We'll look at how memories- individual and collective, material and imagined- are made, un-made, recalled and erased. Conceptions of time and space and matter will be key themes as we unsettle the boundaries between places and memories.

Embodied Narratives and Orientated Bodies - EN&OB

In this module we'll take up storytelling, practices and bodies to explore how our realities are shaped and changed by the things we say, think and do. We'll explore how we become directed towards certain things and bodies and away from others, and how this connects bodies and being to systems of power and resistance.

(Political, Material, Cultural) Ecologies - (PMC)E

In this module we'll explore how things emerge from their political, material, cultural and biological relations. We'll trace these networks and assemblages and ecologies and muddle all of these together. We'll emphasise that matter matters and that things are always embedded in their relations.
