Course Learning Outcomes

Worldviews and Visions examines how conceptual and practical dimensions of sustainable development intersect with ethical questions surrounding different actors' visions of a sustainable future. These visions also suggest the need for change and transformation from current unsustainable practice to sustainability. Therefore, we will also explore transitions and transformations for sustainable development that will be required to achieve such visions.

As stated in the syllabus, upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- critically analyse the conceptual and practical dimensions of sustainable development at the local, regional and global level;
- critically evaluate ethical questions with relevance for sustainable development;
- critically relate to and value different actors' visions of a sustainable future.

Course Overview

The course is a seminar series worth 5 credits and runs every Friday from the 23th of September to the 13th of January. There is a **DRAFT** schedule for the course attached. A final schedule will be provided on Studium one week before the start of the course. You can also find this schedule on Studium, the online education management system used by Uppsala University, and the course website (http://www.web.cemus.se/msd/).

The teaching consists of lectures, given by guest lecturers from different academic disciplines and other relevant societal sectors, and seminars run by the course coordinators. The teaching method is based on active student participation and peer-to-peer learning.



Course Examination

As stated in the syllabus:

The student is examined through written preparation for (1 credit) and active participation in seminars and workshops (1 credit), and through written documentation (2.5 credits) and oral presentation (0.5 credits) of a project.

The course is examined through the following mandatory assignments:

- Literature Seminar on Friday, October 28th, 2022
- Oral Presentations on November 4th, 2022
- Academic Writing Workshop conducted on Friday, December 16th, 2022
- Written Documentation of Individual Project due Friday, January 13th, 2023, 23:59
